Independent Practitioner's Review Engagement Report

To the Members of Humboldt and District Chamber of Commerce:

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Practitioner's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express a conclusion on the accompanying financial statements based on our review. We conducted our review in accordance with Canadian generally accepted standards for review engagements, which require us to comply with relevant ethical requirements.

A review of financial statements in accordance with Canadian generally accepted standards for review engagements is a limited assurance engagement. The practitioner performs procedures, primarily consisting of making inquiries of management and others within the entity, as appropriate, and applying analytical procedures, and evaluates the evidence obtained.

The procedures performed in a review are substantially less in extent than, and vary in nature from, those performed in an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Accordingly, we do not express an audit opinion on these financial statements.

Conclusion

Based on our review, nothing has come to our attention that causes us to believe that the financial statements do not present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Humboldt and District Chamber of Commerce as at December 31, 2022, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Notes to Financial Statements

For the year ended December 31, 2022

The Humboldt and District Chamber of Commerce (the "Chamber") was incorporated under the Non-profit Corporations Act of Saskatchewan on August 8, 2000. The Chamber is a member driven organization whose mandate is to foster business development in the City of Humboldt and surrounding district. As a not-for-profit organization, the Chamber is not subject to income tax.

The Chamber also operated the Visitor Information Centre and Historical Park Campground (the "Centre"), as well as a minigolf course, which are owned by the City of Humboldt. The Centre, which included the office space occupied by the Chamber, was under a contract that was renewed annually, and the campground was under a long-term contract through 2022. The City of Humboldt provided an annual operating grant of \$16,000 (2021 - \$16,000) to support those facilities. This contract was not renewed, and resulted in the Chamber relocating to a new office space.

1. Significant accounting policies

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations and include the following policies:

a. Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Significant items subject to such estimates and assumptions include the carrying amount and useful lives of tangible capital assets, and valuation allowances for receivables. Actual results could differ from those estimates and may have impact on future periods.

b. Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand and cash on deposit net of outstanding cheques.

c. Short-term investments

Short-term investments consist of term deposits with maturity dates ranging from 91 days to twelve months from the date of acquisition.

d. Financial instruments

The Chamber's financial instruments, consisting of cash and cash equivalents, accounts receivable, short-term investments, investments in co-operatives, accounts payable and accrued liabilities, and Canada Emergency Business Account loan are initially recognized at fair value, and subsequently measured at amortized cost.

e. Inventory

Inventory, consisting of firewood for the campground, is stated at the lower of cost and net realizable value.

f. Tangible capital assets

Tangible capital assets are recorded at cost. Amortization is provided for using the declining balance method over the estimated useful lives as follows for the major classes of assets:

1. Significant accounting policies (continued)

g. Revenue recognition

The Chamber follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions, including grants, are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expense is incurred. Unrestricted contributions, which consist of Mark of Excellence awards, BID contract, Christmas promotions, meetings and promotions, interest and sundry, camping, minigolf, fall business showcase and tradeshow, government assistance, and other revenue are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Memberships and group insurance are recognized in the year to which they pertain.

2. Short-term investments

Short-term investments consists of term deposits bearing interest between 1.10% - 3.48% (2021 - 0.60%), maturing from March - September, 2023.

6. Canada Emergency Business Account Loan ("CEBA")

The Chamber applied for and received the \$40,000 CEBA loan in the 2020 fiscal year. An additional \$20,000 was applied for and received in the 2021 fiscal year. The loan was provided by the Government of Canada to provide capital to organizations to see them through the current challenges and better position them to return to providing services and creating employment. The loan is unsecured.

The loan is interest free to December 31, 2023. If the loan is paid back by December 31, 2023, \$20,000 of the loan will be forgiven. If the loan is not repaid by that date, the full \$60,000 loan will be converted to a loan repayable over three years, plus interest at 5%. The forgivable portion of the loan has been included in government assistance income in the prior years (2021 - \$10.000).

Also included in government assistance is Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy of \$nil (2021 - \$3,386), and 10% Temporary Wage Subsidy of \$nil (2021 - \$1,386).

7. Commitments

The Chamber leases its premises from the City of Humboldt under a long-term operating lease, expiring September 2027. Minimum annual lease payments are as follows:

8. Related party transactions

The Chamber purchased computer equipment for \$600 (2021 - \$1,554), office supplies for \$1,011 (2021 - \$999), office improvements for \$321 (2021 - \$nil), and advertising \$200 (2021 - \$nil) from a director's company. These transactions occur in the normal course of operations and are measured at the exchange amount, which is the amount of consideration established and agreed to by the related parties, and which in management's opinion is comparable to amounts that would have been paid to non-related parties.

9. Financial instrument risks

The Chamber is exposed to the following significant risks through its use of financial instruments:

Credit risk: The Chamber's exposure to credit risk related to accounts receivable and arises from the possibility that a customer does not fulfill its obligations. No individual customer is significant to the Chamber. There has been no change to credit risk from the prior year. The amounts due are from a variety of customers and as such, there is no significant concentration of credit risk.

Liquidity risk: The Chamber's exposure to liquidity risk is dependent on its ability to continue to generate funds to meet commitments and sustain operations, including continued support from the City of Humboldt. As the Chamber no longer operates the Visitor Information Centre and Historical Park Campground, they will no longer be eligible for the City of Humboldt grant, increasing liquidity risk from the prior year.

Interest rate risk: The Chamber has sourced \$60,000 in interest-free debt (note 6) from a COVID-19 government relief program. Should this debt not be repaid upon termination of the interest-free period it may require refinancing at interest rates in effect at that time. There has been no substantial change to interest rate risk compared to the prior year.

Campground Report for 2022

Overall

2022 was the final year for the operation of the Humboldt Historic Campground and Mini-golf by the Humboldt and District Chamber of Commerce.

First, the Humboldt and District Chamber of Commerce would like to thank the Mayor and Council for the 22 years of partnership in the Campground. For more than 2 decades, the Chamber of Commerce has been able to provide excellent accommodations and guidance for visitors to our area—and for that we are eternally grateful. In addition, the support of the Leisure Services staff was invaluable throughout the summer season.

In the previous two years, the volume of nights stayed at the campground has steadily decreased. Covid and the economy played significant roles in the revenue losses.

The advent of the mobile device (IE cell phones/tablets etc) has played a significant and detrimental part in the demise of 'visitor information' dissemination. Each year of operation, saw a logarithmic decline in people coming into the office. In fact, the majority of people utilize their handheld devices to get directions, find services, etc.

Staffing

We were very fortunate for 2022 to have two very strong students employed with us. Deryk and Tyler were quiet, professional, courteous and motivated. We once again partnered with our friends at Cultural Services to do a tour of all the tourism facilities we have in the region—including the water tower, original Humboldt, Museum, Gallery and Mount Carmel.

In addition to their campground workload, the students were running to businesses in the Humboldt Downtown BID delivering flyers, information and picking up materials.

With the many challenges we had in 2022, there were very few incidents that required the students to contact the campground manager or I. There were, though, many conversations afterwards to let them know why the customers behaviour was not appropriate. Also, to encourage them so they know how they reacted was proper.

Again, great to have these two young men employed by us.

Kristal Hart, managed the campground this year, as in previous years. Great job. While hers was the most challenging—she handled it with aplomb. As has often been said, when you can hear laughter with the customers it is the best work environment to be in—and that was the case at the front desk of the Humboldt Historic Campground.
